### **U.S. Term Limits Praises David Larsen for Signing Term Limits Pledge**

Washington, D.C. – U.S. Term Limits (USTL), the leader in the national movement to limit terms for elected officials, today praised New Jersey U.S. House candidate David Larsen (District 7) for signing its congressional term limits pledge.

In November of 2014, 14 new U.S. Term Limits pledge signers were elected to Congress – including five new U.S. Senators.

USTL President Philip Blumel commented on Perkins’s pledge, saying, “We applaud David Larsen for his commitment to the principles of the founding fathers and to restoring citizen government in Congress. Larsen’s support of term limits shows that we still have candidates out there that are willing to work for the principles of our founding fathers.”

The U.S. Term Limits Amendment Pledge is provided to every announced candidate for federal office. It reads, “I pledge that as a member of Congress I will cosponsor and vote for the U.S. Term Limits amendment of three (3) House terms and two (2) Senate terms and no longer limit.”

The U.S. Term Limits Constitutional Amendment has been introduced in both the U.S. Senate by Senator David Vitter (R-LA) and the House of Representatives by Representative Matt Salmon (R-AZ).

Blumel noted, “Americans don’t feel like Congress represents the interest of the people. With the number of career politicians and special interest groups that are getting wealthy off the taxpayer it is no wonder so many feel that those in D.C. are not working for the best interest of the people. Fortunately, with candidates like David Larsen emerging, political pressure will continue to build toward the passage of a term limits amendment.”

According to the last nationwide [poll](#) on term limits conducted by Gallup, the issue enjoys wide bipartisan support. The poll showed that 75% of Americans support congressional term limits.

Gallup’s analysis states, “Republicans and independents are slightly more likely than Democrats to favor term limits; nevertheless, the vast majority of all party groups agree on the issue. Further, Gallup finds no generational differences in support for the proposal.”

Blumel concluded, “It took courage for Larsen to take such a principled stance and to make this issue a key part of his campaign. Congress needs people who have the courage to stand up for the people over the special interests.”
