



FL11 TERM LIMITS POLL: EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

US Term Limits Survey of 300 Likely Republican Primary Voters
 in Florida Congressional District 11
 Conducted by RMG Research, November 14-19, 2023

Survey Summary: The results of this recently completed FL11 survey show that FL11 Republican voters overwhelmingly support term limits for members of Congress. Support for term limits is broad across all political and demographic groups. **An overwhelming 92% of the voters approve of an amendment to the U.S. Constitution that will place term limits on U.S. Senators and U.S. House Representatives.** Of the respondents who support term limits, 65% favor 6-years total or less as the limit, the majority (38%) indicating U.S. House members should only serve for four years. They also indicated that they are more likely to support state lawmakers who help advance congressional term limits.

Methodology

The survey of 300 likely republican primary voters was conducted for USTL on November 14-19, 2023. Field work for the survey was conducted by RMG Research, Inc. Certain quotas were applied, and the sample was lightly weighted by gender, age, and race. Likely voters were determined by a screening process within the survey.

The margin of sampling error for the full sample is +/- 5.7 percentage points.
